<u>The Feast of the Poets</u> online event at Keats House is part of the 200th anniversary celebrations of Keats and discusses the role of place in creative thought and what makes a totally creative and inspiring space.

Where are you most at home: a poet's drawing room, swimming in a pond, stately home's gallery, at outdoor concerts, striding over open space or under glades of trees? Hampstead Heath is special to many people and has all of these. Importantly, they are all managed spaces.

Where architecture is described as the poetic use of light and space, the walking tour looks at the reciprocal nature of figure and ground, how we have defined, enclosed, curated or managed 'nature'. Highlights include the relationship to one of our greatest sensory poets, Keats, who lived nearby.
